Classroom Expectations

Band students are expected to always be:

1. **Respectful** – to people and equipment
2. **Responsible** – for doing what they should be doing when they should be doing it.
3. **Resourceful** – using their skills and resources to solve problems

Materials - Students need the following materials in class every day.

- **Instrument** – A flute, clarinet, trumpet, trombone, or bells/snare drum kit and all of the materials required to play it and keep it in working order (see ‘What I Need For Band’.) It is the parent(s)’ or guardian(s)’ responsibility to provide an approved band instrument for his or her child by **Monday, September 19** as well as make sure the instrument remains in proper playing condition throughout the year.
- **Accent on Achievement, Book 1** – This book is specific to your child’s instrument. Every student will need a book to practice at home as well as complete short assignments related to the musical skills and terms that we are learning
- **A Band Folder** – Students will be given loose copies of concert music. It is the students’ responsibility to ensure that these materials come to class every day and stay in good condition.
- **Pencil** – Each student is required to have a pencil at his or her seat every day of class. We will often make notes and changes in our music. We ask for pencils and not pens so that students can erase as necessary.

Practice Expectations – Students can only make progress on their instrument through intentional practice at home. Learning to play an instrument bears many similarities to training for an athletic event: It requires daily, purposeful training to improve and prevent frustration.

You can help your student succeed by working with them to set aside 15-30 minutes per day to play their instrument. Good practice should sound like:

- **At least some long tones, flexibility exercises, and scales.** A good warm up is important for the physical as well as the mental element of playing. In the first years, much of the progress students make comes from regular use of these techniques.
- **Singing, Counting, Clapping, Speaking Note Names, etc.** Part of practicing with intent is breaking the work into smaller parts. Students using these techniques are deliberately improving their knowledge and performance in one area and then applying it to playing the instrument.
- **Making good, recognizable sounds.** After the first few band classes, students should be able to play some recognizable melodies. If it sounds like your child is playing one note, or making bad sounds, feel free to offer some assistance.
- **At least some rest.** Like physical exercise, practice is best done in intervals. Students who play for many minutes without pause risk developing bad habits as a result of muscle fatigue. No one starts their workout by bench-pressing hundreds of pounds or running a marathon; we work up to it.

Grading - Band grades will be earned in three categories: **Participation, Preparation, and Performance.**
